The Echo Foundation Film, *In The Footsteps of Elie Wiesel*, wins 1st Place in the Documentary Category at CENFLO Film Festival

September 14, 2011 (Charlotte, N.C.) – [The Echo Foundation](http://www.echofoundation.org) documentary film, [In The Footsteps of Elie Wiesel](http://www.echofoundation.org), won first place in the documentary category at the Central Florida Film Festival (CENFLO) in Ocoee, Fla. CENFLO presented three screenings of the film during the Labor Day weekend festival, including a special program for Ocoee High School students featuring a dialogue with the film's director and executive producer, Stephanie Ansaldo. The award was presented by festival founder and executive director, Bob Cook, at the 6th Annual Award Ceremony. In The Footsteps of Elie Wiesel, illuminates two parallel stories, woven together through time and history, as 12 young people come face to face with evil and redemption. The film chronicles the journey of Charlotte, N.C., high school students as they trace the life experiences and formative environments of Holocaust survivor and Nobel Peace Prize laureate Elie Wiesel – a coming of age story in the footsteps of a great man. Photo and film images of Wiesel give context and weight to the student experience.

Audiences have a unique window into the thought processes of the students as they share their journal entries with insights that accompany their journey. What transpires is a social dialogue with history as these young people become witnesses to the past, grasp their responsibility to humanity, and embrace their personal power to make a difference.

In addition to stunning imagery of the environments that shaped Wiesel, the documentary features archival Holocaust footage, original footage of speeches by Wiesel, interviews with Holocaust survivors and historians, footage of current events and the thoughtful reflections of the students who look to a more just future.

Charlotte-based [Indievision](#) produced the film in association with [Emulsion Arts](#). Led by Executive Producer Bert C. Hesse, Indievision's recent films were presented at the 2006 Berlin and Cannes film markets. Emulsion Arts is an award-winning film production company. Stephanie Ansaldo, president of The Echo Foundation, directed and produced the film. *In The Footsteps of Elie Wiesel* features an introduction by Richard Gere, music and lyrics by New York Fifth Avenue Synagogue Cantor Joseph Malovany and an original score by [Fred Story](#), a nationally recognized composer whose numerous credits include six Emmy Awards. About Elie Wiesel

[Elie Wiesel](#) was born in 1928 in Sighet, Transylvania, now part of Romania. At age 15, he and his family were deported by the Nazis to Auschwitz. His mother and younger sister perished, his two older sisters survived. Wiesel and his father were later transported to Buchenwald, where his father died shortly before the camp was liberated in April 1945. He wrote about his experience in the death camps in his internationally acclaimed memoir, “La Nuit” or “Night,” which has since been translated into more than 30 languages.

Wiesel is the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University, where he is a member of the faculty in the Department of Religion as well as the Department of Philosophy. He is Chairman of The Elie Wiesel Foundation for Humanity, an organization he and his wife created to fight indifference, intolerance and injustice. He is the author of more than 50 books of fiction and non-fiction, and the recipient of numerous awards, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the U.S. Congressional Gold Medal and the Medal of Liberty Award, and the rank of Grand-Croix in the French Legion of Honor.
